

This international seminar examines the intersections between colonial legacies, educational systems, and decolonial pedagogies within a global framework. Interdisciplinary by design, it fosters dialogue between contemporary history and intercultural pedagogy.

The programme consists of two sessions: a Public History workshop inviting students to critically engage with archival footage and postcolonial literary texts, and an academic symposium dedicated to research presentations and scholarly debate on decolonizing education.

Through images, testimonies, and critical conversations, the seminar asks: what does it mean to teach and learn beyond imperial legacies, and how might we imagine education otherwise?
